## **Divine Representations:**

*Omniodoxy* Cometan, Astronist Institution, 2019-02-11 The *Omniodoxy* is the founding treatise of the Astronist religion and was solely authored by the philosopher and religious founder Cometan Partitioned into twelve disquisitions each of which are further divided into hundreds of discourses which are themselves titled by those which are known as rubrals The *Omniodoxy* has been codified according to a unique writing structure known as insentence The *Omniodoxy* not only forms the foundations of Astronism but it remains the primary modern contributor and the book that ignited the establishment of the Astronic tradition of religion which encompasses the philosophy of Astronism Introducing brand new philosophical concepts such as cosmocentricity reascensionism transcensionism and sentientism amongst many others The *Omniodoxy* remains the principal signifier of a new era in philosophy The *Omniodoxy* births hundreds of new belief orientations schools of thought neologisms disciplines of study theories and concepts which when combined and considered collectively have formed the basis of Astronism The authorship of The *Omniodoxy* rests with the single individual philosopher Cometan who began writing The *Omniodoxy* at the age of seventeen driven by what he terms as personal inspiration The historical origination of The *Omniodoxy* rests in its authorship by Brandon Taylorian during early 21st century England specifically in the northern county of Lancashire Like in all textual criticism the timing and location of the codification of The *Omniodoxy* is integral to understanding why and how it was written especially by considering the influential factors impacting Taylorian during his construction of the text particularly the cultural political religious and social contexts of Taylorian's personal life and of wider society at the time This forms an important branch of study within omnidoxicology known as omnidoxical criticism or omnidoxical exegesis in which scholars study and investigate The *Omniodoxy* in order to discern conclusive judgements inspired by how where why by whom for whom and in what circumstances The *Omniodoxy* was written **The Descent from the Mountain** Martin Ravndal Hauge, 2001-04-01 This close reading of Exodus 19 40 focuses on the repetition of the encounter on the mountain This double encounter is expressed in a narrative structure of preparatory episodes climaxed by the theophany The tension of the narrative is linked to the people as the unlikely heroes of encounter and solved by the divine descent from the divine mountain to the man made tent The new situation of permanent encounter is foregrounded by the juxtaposed stories of pre and post Sinai journey and the theme of the substitution of Moses underlines a radical reinterpretation of traditional concepts inviting the reader to embark on a process of identification *The Triumph of the Symbol* Tallay Ornan, 2005 This book analyzes the history of Mesopotamian imagery from the mid second to mid first millennium BCE It demonstrates that in spite of rich textual evidence which grants the Mesopotamian gods and goddesses an anthropomorphic form there was a clear abstention in various media from visualizing the gods in such a form True divine human shaped cultic images existed in Mesopotamian temples But as a rule non anthropomorphic visual agents such as inanimate objects animals or fantastic hybrids replaced these figures when they were portrayed outside of their sacred

enclosures This tendency reached its peak in first millennium Babylonia and Assyria The removal of the Mesopotamian human shaped deity from pictorial renderings resembles the Biblical agenda not only in its avoidance of displaying a divine image but also in the implied dual perception of the divine according to the Bible and the Assyro Babylonian concept the divine was conceived as having a human form yet in both cases anthropomorphism was also concealed or rejected though to a different degree In the present book this dual approach toward the divine image is considered as a reflection of two associated rather than contradictory religious worldviews The plausible consolidation of the relevant Biblical accounts just before the Babylonian Exile or more probably within the Exile in both cases during a period of strong Assyrian and Babylonian hegemony points to a direct correspondence between comparable religious phenomena It is suggested that far from their homeland and in the absence of a temple for their god the Judahite deportees adopted and intensified the Mesopotamian avoidance of anthropomorphic pictorial portrayals of deities While the Babylonian representations remained confined to temples the exiles would have turned a cultic reality i e the nonwritten Babylonian custom into a written articulated law that explicitly forbade the pictorial representation of God **Sacred Symbols** River Stone, AI, 2025-05-06

Pseudo-Dionysius (the Areopagite.), 1894 **Sculpture, weaving, and the body in Plato** Zacharoula Petraki, 2023-08-21 Plato's *Timaeus* is unique in Greek Antiquity for presenting the creation of the world as the work of a divine demiurge The maker bestows order on sensible things and imitates the world of the intellect by using the Forms as models While the creation myth of the *Timaeus* seems unparalleled this book argues that it is not the first of Plato's dialogues to use artistic language to articulate the relationship of the objects of the material world to the world of the intellect The book adopts an interpretative angle that is sensitive to the visual and art historical developments of Classical Athens to argue that sculpture

revolutionized by the advent of the lost wax technique for the production of bronze statues lies at the heart of Plato's conception of the relation of the human soul and body to the Forms. It shows that despite the severe criticism of mimesis in the Republic, Plato's use of artistic language rests on a positive model of mimesis. Plato was in fact engaged in a constructive dialogue with material culture and he found in the technical processes and the cultural semantics of sculpture and of the art of weaving a valuable way to conceptualise and communicate complex ideas about humans' relation to the Forms.
