The Colonel: The Life and Wars of Henry Stimson, 1867-1950 Godfrey Hodgson, 2020-02-24 Henry Stimson's life story parallels America's rise to international power in the 20th century. Godfrey Hodgson shows how this remarkable statesman helped define and carry out his country's new responsibilities as America became the most powerful nation on earth. After Yale and Harvard Law School in the 1880s, Stimson helped found a law firm that is still a major force on Wall Street. He served as US Attorney for New York and ran for governor of the state on the Republican ticket. After World War I and renewed legal work, Stimson rejoined public life as special emissary to Nicaragua for Calvin Coolidge and then as Governor General of the Philippines. He served as William Howard Taft's Secretary of War and as Herbert Hoover's Secretary of State. At age 72, Stimson accepted to become FDR's Secretary of War and he organized American victory in World War II and oversaw the birth of American military and political hegemony in the nuclear age. Stimson's career spanned Teddy Roosevelt's imperialist expansionism to the world of Truman, Eisenhower, and Kennedy. He dealt with the role of corporations and how to control them, civil war in Central America. Stimson negotiated the first truce between Somoza and Sandino in Nicaragua in 1927, the US position in the Philippines, the rise of Japan, which he dealt with before World War I, America's commitment to helping Europe achieve stability, the terrors of the nuclear age. Stimson chaired the meetings that decided to drop the bomb on Hiroshima and shortly before his death wrote the earliest and most profound reassessment and repudiation of nuclear weaponry. In his many positions, Stimson mentored some of the best and brightest in American public service: Acheson, Lovett, Harriman, Bundy, and Marshall. Henry L. Stimson was Secretary of War under Taft, Governor General of the Philippines under Coolidge, Secretary of State under Hoover, and Secretary of War under FDR. The atom bombs were built and dropped under Stimson's supervision and authority. The Eagle and the Rising Sun Alan Schom,2004 On Saturday August 2 1941 the Washington Post reported that President Franklin D Roosevelt would depart the next day for a fishing vacation aboard his yacht Potomac By the morning of August 5 the Potomac was sailing toward the fishing waters off Cape Cod but the president was not on board Having quietly disembarked in the middle of the night the president now joined by his top military advisors was headed for Newfoundland where the U S and British governments would meet in a secret summit to coordinate their military efforts although the United States had yet to declare war on Germany The British were appalled at the state of American preparedness one British colonel remarking They have a long way to go before they can play any decisive part in the war But ready or not the United States would be catapulted into World War II within a matter of months Alan Schom s superb histories and

The October 20, 1950 death of Henry Lewis Stimson, 1867-1950, marked the end of an extraordinarily long career of public service. A Republican, Stimson served as Secretary of War under William H. Taft (1911-1913), Secretary of State under Herbert Hoover (1929-1933) and Secretary of War under Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman (1940-1945). Stimson, an early proponent of military preparedness, fought in World War I, headed a special electoral mission to Nicaragua in 1927, served as Governor General of the Philippines from 1927-1929 and was an active public commentator and informal advisor on foreign affairs during the building international crisis of the 1930s and after World War II. The papers consist of correspondence, letter books, speeches, articles, letters to the editor, statements prepared for presentation to Congress and substantial subject files with clippings, printed matter, reports, memoranda and photographs related to Henry Stimson's various public offices. The Diaries of Henry Lewis Stimson, 1909-1945, 2023 The Henry Lewis Stimson diaries spanning the years 1909-45 cover a long public career and offer scholars an invaluable historical source. Stimson began keeping the diaries in 1909 when he was forty-two years old. Characteristically, he made a conscious decision at that time to keep a full record of his public life, and the diary was maintained down to his last day in public office on September 21, 1945. Although the diaries are full of strongly expressed views on people, issues and events, many statements are veiled or guarded, and revelations of the private man are few and inadvertent. As a political document, however, and as a political testament, the diaries stand as a significant personal account of the career of an American statesman of the first rank. The diaries are most detailed during those years that Stimson held public office as secretary of war under President William Howard Taft (1911-1913), colonel of field artillery with the American Expeditionary Force in France (1917-1918), special envoy of President Calvin Coolidge to Nicaragua (1927), governor general of the Philippine Islands (1928-1929), secretary of state under President Herbert Hoover (1929-1933) and secretary of war under Presidents Franklin D.
