The Cambridge History of Literary Criticism: Volume 9, Twentieth-Century Historical, Philosophical and Psychological Perspectives George Alexander Kennedy, Christa Knellwolf, 1989 This ninth volume in The Cambridge History of Literary Criticism presents a wide ranging survey of developments in literary criticism and theory during the last century Drawing on the combined expertise of a large team of specialist scholars it offers an authoritative account of the various movements of thought that have made the late twentieth century such a richly productive period in the history of criticism The aim has been to cover developments which have had greatest impact on the academic study of literature along with background chapters that place those movements in a broader intellectual national and socio cultural perspective In comparison with Volumes Seven and Eight also devoted to twentieth century developments there is marked emphasis on the rethinking of historical and philosophical approaches which have emerged especially during the past two decades as among the most challenging areas of debate

The Crucial Race Question, Or, Where and how Shall the Color Line be Drawn William Montgomery Brown, 1907 Following the Color Line Ray Stannard Baker, 1908 Critical White Studies Richard Delgado, Jean Stefancic, 1997 No longer content with accepting whiteness as the norm critical scholars have turned their attention to whiteness itself In Critical White Studies Looking Behind the Mirror numerous thinkers including Toni Morrison Eric Foner Peggy McIntosh Andrew Hacker Ruth Frankenberg John Howard Griffin David Roediger Kathleen Heal Cleaver Noel Ignatiev Cherrie Moraga and Reginald Horsman attack such questions as How was whiteness invented and why How has the category whiteness changed over time Why did some immigrant groups such as the Irish and Jews start out as nonwhite and later become white Can some individual people be both white and nonwhite at different times and what does it mean to pass for white At what point does pride in being white cross the line into white power or white supremacy What can whites concerned over racial inequity or white privilege do about it Science and pseudoscience are presented side by side to demonstrate how our views on whiteness often reflect preconception not fact For example most scientists hold that race is not a valid scientific category genetic differences between races are insignificant compared to those within them Yet the one drop rule whereby those with any nonwhite heritage are classified as nonwhite persists even today As the bell curve controversy shows race concepts die hard especially when power and prestige lie behind them A sweeping portrait of the emerging field of whiteness studies Critical White Studies presents for the first time the best work from sociology law history cultural studies and literature Delgado and Stefancic expressly offer critical white studies as the next step in critical race theory In focusing on whiteness not only do they ask nonwhites to investigate more closely for what it means for others to be white but also they invite whites to examine themselves more searchingly and to look behind the mirror

Sounding the Color Line Erich Nunn, 2015-06-01 Sounding the Color Line explores how competing understandings of the U S South in the first decades of the twentieth century have led us to experience musical forms sounds and genres in racialized contexts Yet though we may speak of white or black music rock or rap sounds constantly leak through such barriers A critical disjuncture exists then between actual interracial musical and cultural forms on the one hand and racialized structures of feeling on the other This is nowhere more apparent than in the South Like Jim Crow segregation the separation of musical forms along racial lines has required enormous energy to maintain How asks Nunn did the protocols structuring listeners racial associations arise How have they evolved and been maintained in the face of repeated transgressions of the musical color line Considering the South

as the imagined ground where conflicts of racial and national identities are staged this book looks at developing ideas concerning folk song and racial and cultural nationalism alongside the competing and sometimes contradictory workings of an emerging culture industry Drawing on a diverse archive of musical recordings critical artifacts and literary texts Nunn reveals how the musical color line has not only been established and maintained but also repeatedly crossed fractured and reformed This push and pull between segregationist cultural logics and music s disrespect of racially defined boundaries is an animating force in twentieth century American popular culture
