Out of the Horrors of War Audra Jennings, 2023-09 From workplace accidents to polio epidemics and new waves of immigration to the returning veterans of World War II the first half of the twentieth century brought the issue of disability what it was what it meant and how to address it into national focus Out of the Horrors of War Disability Politics in World War II America explores the history of disability activism concentrating on the American Federation of the Physically Handicapped AFPH a national cross disability organization founded during World War II to address federal disability policy Unlike earlier disability groups which had been organized around specific disabilities or shared military experience AFPH brought thousands of disabled citizens and veterans into the national political arena demanding equal access to economic security and full citizenship At its core the AFPH legislative campaign pushed the federal government to move disabled citizens from the margins to the center of the welfare state Through extensive archival research Audra Jennings examines the history of AFPH and its enduring legacy in the disability rights movement Counter to most narratives that place the inception of disability activism in the 1970s Jennings argues that the disability rights movement is firmly rooted in the politics of World War II In the years immediately following the war leaders in AFPH worked

with organized labor movements to advocate for an ambitious political agenda including employer education campaigns a federal pension program improved access to healthcare and education and an affirmative action program for disabled workers Out of the Horrors of War extends the arc of the disability rights movement into the 1940s and traces how its terms of inclusion influenced the movement for decades after leading up to the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990

California and the Politics of Disability, 1850-1970 Eileen V. Wallis, 2023-03-31 This book explores the political legal medical and social battles that led to the widespread institutionalization of Californians with disabilities from the gold rush to the 1970s By the early twentieth century most American states had specialized facilities dedicated to both the care and the control of individuals with disabilities Institutions reflect the lived historical experience of many Americans with disabilities in this era Yet we know relatively little about how such state institutions fit into specific regional state or local contexts west of the Mississippi River how those contexts shaped how institutions evolved over time or how regional institutions fit into the USA s contentious history of care and control of Americans with mental and developmental disabilities This book examines how medical social and political arguments that individuals with disabilities needed to be institutionalized became enshrined in state law in California through the creation of a bureaucracy of disability Using Los Angeles County as a case study the book also considers how the friction between state and county policy in turn influenced the treatment of individuals within such facilities Furthermore the book tracks how the mission and methods of such institutions evolved over time culminating in the 1960s with the birth of the disability rights movement and the complete rewriting of California s laws on the treatment and rights of Californians with disabilities This book is a must read for those interested in the history of California and the

American West and for anyone interested in how the intersections of disability politics and activism shaped our historical understanding of life for Americans with disabilities

Abrams, 2016-04-23 This book presents the early existential phenomenology of Martin Heidegger as a way to reformulate academic disability studies and activist disability politics It redresses the almost categorical neglect of human difference in the philosophy of Heidegger It proceeds by applying a revised version of his phenomenology to social policy aimed to get disabled persons to work and to methods in rehabilitation science intended to be more client friendly Phenomenological philosophy is extended to the topic of disability while at the same time two key concerns facing disability studies are addressed the roles of capitalism in disablement and of medical practice in the lives of disabled persons By reframing disability as a lived way of being in the world rather than bodily malfunction the book asks how we might rethink medicine and capitalism in democratic ways It aims to transform Heidegger's work in light of his troubling politics to produce a democratic social theory of human difference
