
Voice

Change in voice quality or change in pitch.



Fluency

Unusual repeating of words, stuttering, or taking long pauses.



Speech articulation

Inconsistent pronunciation, distorting sounds, and omitting full sounds.



Language

Problems with understanding conversations and communication.
