

## C.L.R. James, Humanist: A Case Study in Political and Cultural Criticism

Brian W. Alleyne

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In this essay I will discuss the hybrid approach to culture and politics found in the work of C.L.R. James—an amalgam of Marxism and anti-colonialism, informed by a cultural consciousness shaped most strongly by European classics and English literature. I argue that James's work is humanist because it centred on human needs and creative potential, as well as universalist because it sought to articulate a vision of history that encompassed all of humanity, whilst remaining aware of the contradictory and often exclusionary ways in which humanism and universalism have developed as designs for life. I label James a *critical* humanist because he held fast to a vision of a better society, whilst criticising the more unsavoury aspects of Eurocentric variants of humanism. Since the 1960s, in particular, many critics have cast doubt on humanism's claim to speak on behalf of all people, exposing universalist rhetoric as disguise for domination and exploitation. Without denying these trenchant criticisms of humanist ideas, I will argue that James's work suggests that there is much worth salvaging in the humanist project.

The critical conception of humanism that shapes James's work imagines people as makers of life projects, individually and collectively. It is a particular kind of social imaginary that works with dual premises of agents and structures. The American sociologist, C. Wright Mills said of the 'sociological imagination' that it should enable the understanding of how the social and historical interact with the personal. For Mills the central problem to which social science should address itself is that to do with the relation between 'private

*C. L. R. activism and publications *Forging Freedom in W E B Du Bois s Twilight Years* No Deed but Memory proposes to narrate the political social and cultural significance of Du Bois s career during the controversial closing three decades of his life Du Bois s twilight years were tremendously controversial his persistent criticism of the collusion between capitalism and racism and his choice to join the Communist Party in late 1961 raised the ire of many At the time Du Bois s strident advocacy of socialism and turn to communism during the Cold War oriented most scholars away from delving into his late career While only a few scholars have engaged the productivity of Du Bois s later years the fact is that an anticommunist antiradical animus has followed Du Bois in the half century since his death As a result Du Bois scholarship remains impoverished to the extent that academics neglect his later years The essays in *Forging Freedom in W E B Du Bois s Twilight Years* detail selected aspects of Du Bois s later decades and their particular connection to American social political and cultural history between the 1930s and the 1960s While international concerns and a global perspective also fundamentally defined Du Bois s latter years chronicling his final decades in a US context presents fresh insight into his twilight years Du Bois s commitment to freedom s flourishing during this period animated the Black freedom struggle s war against white supremacy Ultimately this book demonstrates that the durability of Du Bois s intellectual achievements remains relevant to the twenty first century
