Pryor, 2007-08-09 Bringing a postcolonial perspective to UK constitutional debates and including a detailed and comparative engagement with the constitutions of Britain's ex colonies this book is an original reflection upon the relationship between the written and the unwritten constitution Can a nation have an unwritten constitution While written constitutions both found and define modern nations Britain is commonly regarded as one of the very few exceptions to this rule Drawing on a range of theories concerning writing law and violence from Robert Cover to Jacques Derrida Constitutions makes a theoretical intervention into conventional constitutional analyses by problematizing the notion of a written constitution on which they are based Situated within the frame of the former British empire this book deconstructs the conventional opposition between the margins and the centre as well as between the written and unwritten by paying very close detailed attention to the constitutional texts under consideration Pryor argues that Britain's unwritten constitution and immemorial common law only take on meaning in a relation of difference with the written constitutions of its former colonies These texts in turn draw on this pre literate origin in order to legitimize themselves The unwritten constitution of Britain can therefore be located and dislocated in postcolonial written constitutions Constitutions is an excellent addition to the bookshelves of all students of the philosophy of law political theory constitutional and administrative law and jurisprudence

About the Author: Dr Pilar Villar Argiz lectures in the Department of English Philology at the University of Granada, Spain, where she obtained a European Doctorate in English Studies (Irish Literature). She is the author of *Eavan Boland's Evolution: As an Irish Woman Poet, An Outsider within an Outsider's Culture* (The Edwin Mellen Press, 2007). She has also published extensively on the representation of femininity in contemporary Irish women's poetry, on cinematic representations of Ireland, and on the theoretical background and application of feminism and postcolonialism to the study of Irish literature. In addition, Dr Villar Argiz has co-edited two books on English literature: *Irish Research Series No 51: Samuel Ferguson and the Culture of Nineteenth-century Ireland* (Eve Patten, 2004). Samuel Ferguson (1810-86) was one of 19th-century Ireland's most influential writers, but his politics and cultural agenda have never been fully understood. This book draws on his neglected prose writings to illuminate his layered ideology and to expose his various determining contexts, including his native Belfast and its Scottish Enlightenment hinterland, the Dublin University Magazine with its fraught literary-political protocol, the communities of the Ordnance Survey Commission, the Nation, and the Royal Irish Academy. Ferguson's guiding agenda is shown to be that of a civic idealism, a grassroots alternative to polarized political trajectories, and a compelling ethos for a conflicted Irish Protestantism. The result is both a portrait of an individual in his time and a detailed engagement with Irish cultural politics from the Union to the Revival.
